




Monthly Incident Comparison 2013 and 2014

During April 2014, Village of East Troy Police Officers handled or responded to 215 incidents. This level of activity compares to April 2013, when officers recorded 234 incidents.




Criminal Cases sent to the District Attorney's Office-15

In April 2014, these cases included Disorderly Conduct, Obstructing Police and Use of a Firearm while Intoxicated.




Juvenile Cases Referred to the District Attorney's Office-11


Municipal Citations-12

Traffic citations are issued for motor vehicle moving and equipment violations, which include Operation of a Motor Vehicle While Intoxicated.

A Sampling of Incidents for Review:

On April 5, at 8:45 am police were on Lilly St. in the Village of East Troy investigating a suspicious incident complaint. During the investigation, police recognized an individual known to have an outstanding felony warrant through the Wisconsin Department of Corrections. Upon seeing the police, the subject fled on foot and needed to be physically restrained. The subject was transported to the Walworth County Jail on the outstanding warrant and additional charges are pending.

On April 10, at 2:50 pm police responded to the area behind Chester Brynes School for a school bus accident. On arrival, police learned a car had struck the school bus and the bus was loaded with children. The children were unhurt during the incident and after their names were obtained transported home by the school district. The driver of the other vehicle was cited for Obstructing Police and violation of the Graduated Driver's License Law.

On April 14, at 2:38 pm police responded to the trailer court for a juvenile who was attempting to commit suicide. When police arrived, they were informed the juvenile had cut themselves and then ran through the woods. Police were able to locate the juvenile and observed blood coming from the arm. The juvenile was detained and transported by East Troy rescue to the hospital.

On April 21 at 6:54 pm police responded to a local gas station for a suicidal subject. When police arrived, the clerk pointed to a subject and advised the subject walked into the gas station and told the clerk he needed help and wanted to kill himself. When police arrived the subject admitted to wanted to commit suicide and voluntarily went to the hospital.

On April 21, at 11:06 pm police responded to a complaint of a vehicle driving recklessly in the parking lot of the High School. When police arrived, the vehicle was gone and during a search of the area, police were able to locate the vehicle. The driver a 20-year-old male admitted to doing donuts in the parking lot and was cited for Disorderly Conduct with a Motor Vehicle.

On April 22, at 5:52 pm police stopped a vehicle for traffic violations. When police approached the driver, they detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage on the driver's breath. The driver performed a standard field sobriety test and was taken into custody for Operation of a Motor Vehicle While Intoxicated.

On April 24, at 8:54 am police responded to a hotel in the village for a civil dispute. When police arrived, they learned two parties owned the hotel and the parties are involved in legal proceedings against each other. One party's representatives attempted to removed documents and other items belonging to the business. Police arrived and advised both parties this needed to go through a formal court process.

On April 26, at 5:37 pm police responded to an apartment on Emery Ct. for an intoxicated individual threatening people with a handgun. Police located the individual's apartment and were able to get the individual to exit the apartment. When the subject exited, he was taken into custody and a subsequent search revealed a handgun in the individual's waistband. The subject was transported to the Walworth County Jail and booked in with several charges.

Officer Rhode- attended the final Operation Click Award presentation and participated in the Drug Take Back. She also attended a Child Abuse Conference.

Officer Demeio-attended Basic Breath Operator Course training.

Officer Buer-attended a training course for identifying Deceptive Behavior.

Chief:

Met with school district staff regarding parking issues at Doubek School and met with school district staff regarding safety and security matters. Attended the Suburban Mutual Aid Response board meeting. Attended Operation Click Award banquet. Assisted Officer Rhode in the Drug Take Back. Meet with Liberty Mutual nurse regarding worker's comp issues. Spoke with Chamber of Commerce regarding June Bike Race and a police department activity with children the day prior to the race. Began reviewing police department policies with new legislation directed at police agencies, which was signed into law on April 18. Developed policy for officer involved shootings to meet new state mandate.

Subject: Intox Class

On April 15,2014-April 17,2014 I attended the basic training program for breath examiner specialist. The training was conducted by instructors from the Department of Transportation Chemical Test Division. The training consisted of approximately 19 hrs of instruction on the EC/IR II, instrumentation principles, OWI statutes, laboratory instruction, pharmacology and physiology of alcohol, laboratory workshops, courtroom testimony, and a final written examination on our last day. To me, the pharmacology and physiology portion of the class was the most interesting because it gave me a better understanding on how alcohol effects the body after consumption, works its way through until we absorb it, how the alcohol gets distributed, and eventually eliminate it. We got an opportunity to drink alcohol in class which is something you don't get to do much in training, but was very beneficial to understand how fast our bodies absorb and dissipate the alcohol differently and how some where effected more/less than others. At the end of the class we took a final examination that consisted of approximately 50 questions, and if passed would receive your permit via mail which I just received this week. Overall, this class was beneficial to me by not only giving me another helpful instrument in retrieving evidence in an OWI arrest but also a better understanding on how alcohol effects persons in different ways.
