




Monthly Incident Comparison 2013 to 2014

During August 2014, Village of East Troy Police Officers handled or responded to 207 incidents. This level of activity compares to August 2013 when officers recorded 297 incidents.




Cases referred to the District Attorney's Office-5

In August 2014, these included Child Abuse Causing Harm, and Disorderly Conduct.




Juvenile Cases Referred to the District Attorney's Office – 10

These included Disorderly Conduct, Trespass to Dwelling, Criminal Damage to Property and Intimidating a Witness.




Municipal Citations – 5




Citations or Referrals including Warning Citations August 2014 – 14

Chief-

This will be a report reference my attendance to The 2014 (WNOA) Wisconsin Narcotics Officer's Association Conference in Green Bay WI from August 20-22. The WNOA is a conference which allows narcotics officers from municipal, state and federal agencies across the state of Wisconsin to train and network. It allows officers to share experiences, successes and failures to ensure the future of narcotics enforcement is conducted to the highest ability of law enforcement. The conference has trainings and seminars from instructors within Wisconsin along with other agencies such as The Chicago Police Department and DEA. Some of the courses I attended were: **Confidential informant handling**; instructed by Racine ADA Riek; this course guided officers on how to conduct investigations while utilizing CIs. **Locating hidden compartments and traps within houses and vehicles**; this course was instructed by Sergeant Hamilton with The Chicago Police Department; this course trained officers what to look for when dealing with hidden areas drug dealers utilize to conceal weapons, drugs and money. **Clandestine Meth Labs** which was presented by special agents with DCI; this course showed officers the methods in which Methamphetamine is produced and the dangers that go into searching and working around meth labs. **Legal update** which was presented by ADA Riek with Racine County DA's Office; this update provides some of the latest narcotics cases heard by the appellate and supreme court of Wisconsin; the cases were broken down and explanations for the decisions were discussed.

This training is a great opportunity to keep updated with the latest narcotics trends and the methods used to enforce them; it also provided priceless networking allowing officers to reach out across the state when investigating drug crimes.
