




Monthly Incident Comparison 2013 to 2014

During December 2014, Village of East Troy Police Officers handled or responded to 173 incidents. This level of activity compares to December 2013 when officers recorded 230 incidents.




Cases referred to the District Attorney's Office-7

In December 2014, these included but not limited to Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Possession of Narcotics and Resisting Police.




Juvenile Cases Referred to the District Attorney-0




Municipal Citations-17

I wanted to take this time to thank all of you for your dedication and accomplishments for 2014. During this period, we have varied in numbers 8-full time officers and 1-2 part-time officers. Yet we have managed to operate 24 hours a day and 7 days a week. We have never had a minute or hour when a Village of East Troy Police Officer was not on duty. When I look back over the past 12 months, I see a team of dedicated men and women who have handled many difficult and dangerous tasks and assignments, at times surpassing activities and levels of similar sized or larger law enforcement agencies.

So far, in 2014 you have collectively handled 2247 incidents or 405 pages (a small book) when you run the list of incidents in FoRS and you have accumulated the following statistics:

Referred for prosecution to the County Court:

149-cases many of these cases felonies to the District Attorney's Office;

68-cases again many of these felonies to Juvenile Court.

Referred to or cited into the Municipal Court (Judge Cotter),

161-ordinance violation cases from Battery to Possession of Drugs;

973- traffic violations from Operating While Intoxicated to speeding violations.

I find this truly amazing however, what I find more amazing are these statistics:

Over 75 requests under the Open Records Act;

countless photos, transcriptions and other documentation attached to individual cases,

14- death investigations,

7-emergency detentions,

Evidence Room taking in 100's of pieces of evidence and maintaining 100% accountability;

Operation Click the number of hours spent working with the children to be a part of this;

managing TraCs and the hours it takes to keep it running;
processing and approval of 2247 incident reports and the citations and warnings;
classes and presentations given to school groups, the fire department and others;
you have also learned a new word "YikYak" and how it can quickly affect a community and;
with all of this, you have continued to maintain the primary operation of the Police Department.

Thank you all for your commitment to the Police Department and I feel blessed to be a part of an organization of such fine Police Officers.



Local law enforcement receives tourniquets through grant program

Police officers are usually the first on the scene when a car crashes or there has been a severe industrial accident causing injury.

It often falls to law enforcement personnel to render first aid until the EMTs arrive. Sometimes, that aid can mean the difference between life and death.

Fontana Police Chief Steve Olson said when someone is bleeding out seconds count and having the proper medical supplies can save lives.

Olson said he was at a training meeting last year when the subject of medical training and supplies came up and how the departments could improve response and serve the community better.

"It came out that while a lot of police departments have tourniquets in their first aid kits and squad cars, not many officers have them with them all the time," Olson said. "I knew a company that had supplied medical equipment in the past, so I contacted the company and asked if they would be inter-

ested and they said it sounded like a good idea to them."

Walworth County law enforcement agencies have been awarded a \$5,570 grant from Enbridge Energy, Superior, through its Community Investment Program, to purchase trauma tourniquets to be used by police in the field.

The grant will cover the cost of 240 tourniquets to be distributed to area police departments and the Walworth County Sheriff's Department. The tourniquets are the same type used by the U.S. Armed Forces, Olson said.

Olson said the goal is for every officer in Walworth County to have a trauma tourniquet on hand at all times.

"I asked every department and they told me how many they wanted," Olson said. "The (Walworth County) Sheriff's Department asked for 90 and Mukwonago asked for something like 10 or 14; they all got exactly what they needed."

Village of East Troy Police Chief Alan Boyes said Monday that his department received a tourniquet for every full- and part-time officer

through the program.

"It probably only cost about \$500 but it's such a good thing to have," Boyes said.

"Twice in Walworth County in the past year, I believe, people were operating chain saws and were injured and needed them," Olson said. "That's the type of situation where I would most commonly expect to see them used in industrial accidents, car crashes, that type of thing."

Olson said the officers in his department had been trained on the proper usage of the tourniquets and he said he expected other agencies would institute training sessions if and where needed.

Boyes said the East Troy Fire Department is going to help train his officers on the proper use of the tourniquets.

Other area police departments receiving trauma tourniquets include the Town of Geneva, Village of Genoa City, City of Lake Geneva, Village of Mukwonago, Village of Sharon, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, City of Whitewater and Village of Walworth.

"We want to especially thank Enbridge Energy for their generosity," Olson said. "If we ever hear anyone in the county now that had to use a tourniquet, it probably came from the grant program and Enbridge Energy's donation."
