



During May 2015, Village of East Troy Police Officers responded to or handled 245 incidents. This compares to May 2014 when officers handled 207 incidents.




Adult Cases referred to the District Attorney's Office – 20




These cases included Possession of Controlled Substance, Bail Jumping and Carrying a Concealed Weapon.


Juvenile Cases referred to the District Attorney's Office – 0





- Alcohol kills more young people than all illegal drugs combined.
- Heavy drinking during adolescence reduces the brain's memory by approximately 10%.
- Of all young drunk drivers killed in crashes, 77% were not wearing their seat belts.
- Approximately three times as many young people as adults die in alcohol-related crashes per day.
- Over 40% of all traffic fatalities in 2009 were alcohol related.
- About 100,000 females a year are sexually assaulted while intoxicated because they are too incoherent to give consent or defend themselves.
- Each year, more than 5,000 high school-aged kids die on the road.
- The biggest killer among teens in Waukesha County is alcohol related crashes.
- Alcohol kills more young people annually than all illegal drugs combined.

The 13,470 fatalities in alcohol-impaired-driving crashes during 2009 represent an average of one alcohol-impaired-driving fatality every 39 minutes.

The risk of motor vehicle crashes is higher among 16 to 19 year olds than among any other age group.

20% of ALL crashes involve a distracted driver.

20% of deaths in crashes involve use of cell phones.

Using a cell phone while driving is the same as driving at .08.

People using cell phones are 4 times more likely to be involved in a crash.


Dear Chief Boyes:

Heroin Overdose Training

8 hours of Heroin/Drug Training on May 21,2015

Several variations of topics including heroin usage, types of heroin, purity, heroin overdose statistics, methods of injection, and overdose homicide cases. The overdose statistics is what appalled me the most as the number is increasing significantly every year. As of 2007, the increase of heroin deaths is at a steady rate averaging close to a 9% increase every year. A topic that we discussed and spent a large amount of time on is the history and common reasons for overdoses. Since the 1980s when heroin purity was only about 3%, heroin purity today is close to 49% which is a common factor in overdoses as every batch of heroin will deliver a different purity causing someone to use as much as they used last time, but now with a more pure heroin. Price of heroin also dropped and is another large factor into why users begin heroin. Heroin's street value decreased from roughly \$350-400 per gram in the early 1980's to only \$100 a gram causing a high demand for the drug.
