




## Monthly Incident Comparison 2013 to 2014

During November 2014, Village of East Troy Police Officers Handled or responded to 185 incidents. This level of activity compares to November 2013 when officers recorded 238 incidents.




## Cases referred to the District Attorney's Office-22

In October 2014, these included but are not limited to; Manufacturing of THC, Strangulation, and Burglary.




## Juvenile Cases Referred to the District Attorney-5

These included Burglary, Disorderly Conduct and Criminal Damage to Property.




## Municipal Citations-9



## Police departments get grant to boost traffic enforcement

Walworth County police departments kicked off a yearlong effort Wednesday to reduce dangerous driving behaviors.

The Walworth County Sheriff's Department, all municipal police departments in the county except the City of Delavan, and University of Wisconsin-Whitewater police teamed up to form the Walworth County Traffic Task Force.

The task force will comprehensively report traffic citations from all member departments to the state Department of Transportation's Bureau of Transportation Safety. In exchange for reporting the data, the municipalities will receive \$76,000 in Bureau of Transportation Safety and federal Highway Safety Improvement funds.

Of that funding, \$40,000 will be used to enforce drunken driving laws, and the remainder will be used

for seat-belt and speed enforcement, said Sgt. Robert Hall, task force secretary.

The grant runs from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30 and will pay for officers to work about 240 additional four-hour shifts over the next year to reduce and eliminate dangerous driving behaviors.

The departments gathered at the Riviera in Lake Geneva to kick off the enforcement campaign Nov. 14 and expected to conduct

their first patrol as part of the effort Wednesday.

Representatives of the Sheriff's Department and Bloomfield, Lake Geneva, East Troy, Walworth, Sharon, Fontana, Williams Bay and Elkhorn police departments attended the Nov. 15 kick-off. Sgt. Mark Roum, of the Sheriff's Department is the task force president, and Lt. Andy Long, of the Village of Walworth Police Department, is vice president.
