


Monthly Incident Comparison Chart 2012 and 2013.

During October 2013, Village of East Troy Police Officers responded to or handled 251 incidents. This level of activity compares to October 2012 in which officers recorded 226 incidents.




Charges/Individuals Referred to the District Attorney's Office –12

During October 2013, these included Battery, Resisting/Obstructing Police, and Disorderly Conduct.




Criminal Cases Sent to the District Attorney's Office-4




Juvenile Cases Referred to the District Attorney – 6

These are juvenile cases due to the severity or a repetitive offender, are referred to the District Attorney



Incidents of Note:

On October 1 at 11:00 pm police responded to the 2000 block of Division St. for a welfare check. The complainant complained about a highly intoxicated individual "howling" at the moon. Police discovered several empty alcoholic beverage containers. The subject was turned over to family members.

On October 3 at 3:40 pm police responded to the 2700 block of Main St. for a stolen boat report. The complainant reported his motor boat had been taken and witnesses observed the individuals taking the boat. Subsequent investigation revealed the complainant's parents owned the boat and had taken it for non-payment. The complainant was advised to contact his attorney as this was a civil matter.

On October 5 at 3:14 pm police responded to Byrnes St. and the East Troy Electric Railroad Tracks for a reported car vs. train accident. During the investigation police learned the driver of the motor vehicle failed to stop for the posted stop sign striking the train. The driver of the motor vehicle suffered minor injuries and was transported to the hospital. None of the passengers on the train were reported injured.

On October 5 at 9:34 pm police responded to the area of West St. and Graydon Ave. Police were advised the home-coming dance was in progress and the complainant observed two subjects with handguns and wearing camouflage clothing on foot. The school was advised to lockdown and police stood by when the dance was finished. During the evening two subjects were taken into custody and cited for weapon violations, with Airsoft guns.

On October 11 at 11:29 am police responded to the East Troy High School for two disorderly students. The students were loud and swearing at staff when police arrived and both were taken into custody and later released to their parents.

On October 18 at 10:00 am police responded to a complaint in the 2000 block of Townline Road. When police met with the complainant it was learned this was a landlord/tenant dispute and a civil matter. As police were speaking with the landlord a subject was observed by the landlord who lived in the apartment. When police attempted to speak to the subject he provided a false name and date of birth. Police subsequently learned the subject was wanted on a warrant from Racine County. The subject was taken into custody for obstructing police and the warrant.

On October 27 at 9:59 am police responded to the 2900 block of Main St. for an unresponsive subject. Police found the subject had a faint pulse and applied oxygen and the subject was turned over to East Troy Rescue.

Officers:

Officer Rhode-Coordinated the Drug Take Back program.

Officer Ojeda-Conducted firearms training, continued to work with Digicorp on the upgrade to TRACS and attended training in Madison with the Force Science Institute.

Officer Jaekl-Placed reminders on vehicles prior to November 1 winter parking going into effect. Attended training for Officer Crisis Negotiations.

Records Clerks Gerber and Suhm- attended training in Appleton regarding the Wisconsin Open Records Act.

Chief: Attended preplanning meetings for the upcoming East Troy Classic Cycling Race. Assisted in the Drug Take Back program at the police department on October 26. Attended a Special Olympics meeting and dinner. Met with a Lieutenant from Lake Delton Police Department regarding their building a new police facility. Lake Dalton wanted input regarding how the remodeling of this building went and the good and bad parts. Met with Village Attorney regarding union negotiations.

To our Law Enforcement Partners:

On behalf of the Milwaukee District Office of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), I would like to extend our appreciation to all the participating state, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies that participated in the seventh (7th) bi-annual DEA National Pharmaceutical Take Back Initiative event (NTBI VII) on October 26, 2013. The NTBI VII event in Wisconsin included 146 law enforcement partners around the entire State and resulted in a total collection and the destruction of 38,506 lbs (19.25 tons) of unwanted, unused, and expired prescription medications. Wisconsin ranked 4th in the nation in the total amount collected, trailing only the much larger states of California, Texas, and New York. DEA initiated these events in September 2010 with the goal of successfully collaborating with our state, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies for the purpose of removing potentially dangerous unused, expired, or unwanted legal pharmaceutical controlled substances from our nation's medicine cabinets.

Once again – because of your participation - this latest event was a huge success in Wisconsin. The DEA Administrator issued a national press release on November 6, 2013, announcing the results of DEA's 7th effort of the National Prescription Drug Take Back Day. For your information, we have attached a copy of the Administrator's press release to this e-mail.

Thanks again and we look forward to working with each of your agencies during any future NTBI events.



Re: Managing the Wisconsin Public Records Act

On October 15-16th I attended Managing the Wisconsin Public Records Act class held at Fox Valley Technical College in Appleton, WI. I have previously attended this class about 4 years ago hosted by the same instructor, Robert Doran from R.A.Doran & Associates. My goal was to refresh myself with WI laws pertaining to WI Public Records and understanding new court decisions that have recently come out such as Senne vs. Village of Palatine in which the DPPA (Federal Driver Privacy Protection Act) was reviewed.

On Tuesday, October 15, as a class we discussed Policy & Definitions, Procedural Issues and Access to Records. The Hathaway Test was examined which summarizes that public records should be open to the public unless there is clear statutory reasons to deny, limitation under common law, or an overriding public interest in keeping the record confidential. The majority of the class later in the day discussed omitting Personally Identifiable Information from public records. Personally Identifiable Information would refer to name, number, circumstance and other characteristics. The class discussion closed by evaluating the meaning of a "record" and what consists of a "record".

On Wednesday October 16, discussions included: Exempted Records, Appeal and Enforcement and News Media Relations. Several discussions included: Juvenile Records, Traffic Records, Criminal Records, Internal Operations Area, and Open Records Requests. A majority of the concerns were focused on Juvenile Records being released to non-custodial parents. Mr. Doran advised not to release Juvenile Records without obtaining a copy of the custodial agreement and divorce decree from the parent. Another issue affecting many departments is the use of cameras and the release of videos. All videos are subject to open records unless there is a clear reason to deny access. The class closed with a hand on exercise in redacting information using several different examples of a report.

Managing the Wisconsin Public Records Act was two days filled with numerous examples, case law and explanations. I found the classroom instruction not only to be helpful but definitely required in keeping up with the changing case laws regarding Public Records. I feel this class should be attended at least every other year to maintain knowledge and skills needed to release Public Records.


On October 17th and 18th, I attended Force Science Training at the Madison Police Department training facility. The training covered many topics relating to police officers and use of force situations. A few of the objects for training were to effect safer and effective training, more responsible investigations and for officers to be better informed using the information provided.

Some of the topics covered were as follows; Why is the suspect shot in the back, Is your shooting clean, stress reactions related to lethal force encounters, reaction times in lethal force encounter, study on the presence of selective attention in officers, fired cartridge case ejection patterns, performing under pressure, the effect of physical exertion on the recall and recognition and officer positioning on movement during threatening traffic stop scenarios.

The topics were relevant and provided in depth information to officers under stress in deadly force decisions. Training covered reaction times during shootings. How officers may perceive high stress situations differently than captured on video. Training covered statistics regarding officer involved shooting and reactionary gap times. The training was well received and would recommend that all officer attend.
