


## Monthly Incident Comparison 2013 to 2014

During September 2014, Village of East Troy Police Officers handled or responded to 225 incidents. This level of Activity compares to September 2013 when officers recorded 250 incidents.




## Cases referred to the District Attorney's Office – 15


## Juvenile Cases Referred to the District Attorney's Office – 0

Juvenile cases are referred due to the severity of the incident or the repetitiveness of the offender.




## Municipal Citations – 14

Municipal citations are issued for forfeiture violations and are heard in the Village of East Troy Municipal Court, By Judge Cotter.




## Traffic Citations – 92

Re: 2014 CIB Conference

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The 2014 CIB Conference was held at the Radisson Hotel in Green Bay, WI from September 17-19, 2014. This was my first time as an attendee and found the breakout sessions to be beneficial.

Sessions Attended:

Domestic Terrorism-Explained the motivations of violent criminals who are driven by events which occur in the United States.

Boston Marathon Bombing: Key speaker Former Chief Daniel Linskey of the Boston Police Department. The Chief walked attendees through his day and the day of his fellow officers while tracking down the Boston marathon suspects which brings perspective on what to expect and/or prepare for during a major incident in our jurisdiction.

Media Relations: Herding Cats & Chasing Dogs: Key speakers were from the City of Cleveland who discussed the handling of rumors and press accommodations during a major incident.

UCR/IBR: Derek Veitenheimer from WI DOJ discussed and explained the new online UCR program which will be rolling out next month for all agencies. I am currently participating in this program as a test agency. Also discussed the new UCR definition of a Sex Offense.

Active Shooter for Dispatch: This was my favorite session, which analyzed from a dispatcher point of view how to handle an Active Shooter incident. Example used was a mall shooting in Oregon.

WI Threat Brief & Suspicious Activity Reporting: Session analyzed and provided slide presentations of the growing threat of Sovereign Citizens.

Human Trafficking: Covered how to recognize and interview victims of Human Trafficking. Session covered "terms" and "tattoos" to be aware of when with subjects. This is occurring and a growing concern in Wisconsin.

Legal Update: Overviews new cases from the WI courts and the US Supreme Courts which change the way officers can do their duties. Very interesting speaker but nothing of value in this session for records/dispatching.

Overall this conference provides you the opportunity to think and prepare for a major incident in East Troy. I feel I am better prepared if such an incident would occur in how to handle the citizens of East Troy as well as the media and victims. I think it is overall beneficial to attend this conference as long as new sessions are presented every year.

To all retail managers,

I am writing to you today to make you aware of a growing problem in our local communities. It is called Dexing, Triple C's, or Robotripping and also known by other names. It is a high attained by the overdose of cold and cough medications containing Dextromethorphan as an active ingredient. It may not seem like a big deal since this is considered an OTC or over the counter medication, but I can speak from personal experience, that this is not the case. I am asking store managers to take it upon themselves, and not wait for state legislation, to place any and all OTC cold remedies with this ingredient, into a secure location and /or at the very least, monitor their stock of these medications very closely. Because these medications, are cheap and are in small packages, they are very easily shoplifted, concealed and purchased by our young teens.

I would like you to hear my story so you can understand my very passionate request.

On September 8<sup>th</sup>, 2014, my 16 y/o son had an altercation with his father at his residence in Green County. Unbeknownst to us he was abusing Dextromethorphan for about 6 to 8 weeks. He could not be calmed and was taken into detention. The next day before court he had an altercation with Sheriffs deputies and this 5'9", 104 lb., young man was able to stand up with 4 officers holding him down. His custody was awarded to me and because of my profession had to stay in detention until I could pick him up. I arrived at his fathers home on the afternoon of September 10<sup>th</sup> and we found numerous empty foil packets of cold and cough medication in his room as well as empty cold syrup bottles that also included this active ingredient. I picked him up shortly after, and was shocked to see how much weight he had lost. In early August his weight was 124 lbs. He has always been thin but a 20 lb weight loss in just over a month was drastic. We bought some food on the way home to East Troy. He vomited up what he ate as soon as we got home. He continued to vomit frequently for the next 4 days and I was still oblivious as to the severity of his illness. He got better and was eating normally. I thought it would just work it's way out.

On September 16<sup>th</sup>, while I was on the phone, he took money from my desk, and said he needed shampoo and walked himself to the Dollar General store. He came back with a receipt and the change for what he had bought and I thought nothing of it. Through texts with his "friend" in his Dad's community, he stated he took 2 boxes of "C's" during that visit and took an additional 3 boxes the following day. On the 17<sup>th</sup> he was acting strangely and when I sat down and took his pulse he knew he was caught. He said he took some from the Aurora Pharmacy about a month before and had hidden them in his room. The next text to his friend was that he was caught by me and he was done with them.

On September 21<sup>st</sup>, after watching a Packer game at my Mothers house, we returned home. His girlfriend had told him, through texting, that he was bad for her and she couldn't see him anymore. It was as soon as we got home that I believe he took the remainder of the tablets he had left. The empty foil pouches indicate 20 tablets from an amount that started with 80. He consumed the other 60 tablets over a period of 5 days. Within an hour his speech became disjointed. He was telling me what had been going on at his Dad's residence but as his confusion worsened, I knew something was wrong and rushed him to the Emergency room. His condition worsened and I was totally unaware that he had taken anything. He was taken to a mental health facility as an in patient. I visited him on the 22<sup>nd</sup> and the 23<sup>rd</sup> at which time he could not communicate by any means and did not appear to be aware of anything or anyone in his surroundings. It has now been 4 days since that final dose of Coricidin HBP and my son remains in a state of Acute Toxic Psychosis. At this time, we are hopeful that are son will start to "clear" soon, but in rare cases this could become a permanent state.

I understand that in small communities that loss prevention can be challenging due to the expense of containment of products such as these, but the cost of human pain and suffering is much greater. This comes from a loving parent that is presently living a personal hell with no predication of when or, God forbid, IF it will ever end.

With this in mind, I beseech you to please figure out a way to control and restrict these products and keep them out of curious, and impressionable adolescent hands. These products are easy to shoplift because of the size of their packaging and cheap enough to purchase. Only a few states have put legislation in place to restrict access. Please don't wait for Wisconsin to enact a law. Protect our children now and control these products. Thanks for your time.


